
Watch for changes to the Swansea Point Community Association website which is to be redone and will hopefully result in easier access to information.

The High Level Fire Department is a Full Service Department which offers almost every service including Hazmat, Medical, Vehicle Rescue and Wildland Urban Interface (SPU). My career led me to move up the ranks from Firefighter, to Lieutenant and finishing off as a Captain. I also held the position as Fire and Safety Coordinator for the Town of High Level and served as a medic on the local ground ambulance doing responses within High Level and surrounding communities. ## NEPP—Neighbourhood Emergency Preparedness Program Did you know?

Swansea Community Association is in the process of creating a resource list of available equipment, emergency supplies and skill sets of residents of Swansea Point .Names will be put in a google document that will be accessible by a dispatch system. If you have a skill set or equipment that might be needed in an emergency, evacuation alert, power outage etc, you can be added to the list. If a resident requires assistance, a buddy, a person to check on someone who might have needs or is alone, water, land line, a generator they can access potential help thru this tool. We will have several numbers you can call that will be able to access this list and find out if there is help for you!

Please complete your membership form to start the process or stayed tuned to whom you can call to offer help or access help. Information will be posted at the mailboxes in the near future. More information to follow.

Please upload the **Alertable app.** on your phone. Check in with the **CSRD website** to learn how to down load. This app will alert you to any evacuation alert or order in our area on your phone. Why is this helpful? Mobile home Park near 2 mile on and off evacuation alert for flooding, important to know if you are going back and forth to Sicamous. Maybe the road is closed??

### Things learned during last year's evacuation alert

Keep your gas tank full

Keep water, food and documents in a "Go Bag" Check out the CSRD website for more information Anytime there is power, charge phone, secondary battery supplies and laptops.

Know who has water, landline, generators. This will be available through dispatch numbers

Hard lesson learned if power goes off while cooking... make sure you turn off burners immediately! You may not remember the burners are on when power comes back on...

I bring to the community both CISM (Critical Incident Stress Management) and Chaplaincy! I have taken training from the Association of Traumatic Stress Specialist, Assisting Individuals in Crisis, Crisis management from the Salvation Army. I also have completed Incident Command System 100, 200 and 300. I hold a certificate from the BC Association of Fire Chaplains along with 15 years experience on the Swansea Point FD, 6 years as Chief.

This year, 2022, is the 25th anniversary of the '97 landslide debris flow, the 10th anniversary of the 2012 high water bank failure and the 1st anniversary of the forest fire.

### WildSafeBC Columbia Shuswap Program Coordinator

WildSafeBC (WSBC) is a program managed by the British Columbia Conservation Foundation (BCCF), a registered charity and not-for-profit. WildSafeBC's mandate is summarized in this following mission statement:

WildSafeBC is the provincial leader in preventing conflict with wildlife through collaboration, education, and community solutions.

British Columbia is one of the most biologically diverse provinces in Canada and we have some of the highest densities of bears, cougars and wolves in North America. As our society has become more urbanized, our populations continue to grow, and we continue to attract a high number of visitors, the number of interactions between wildlife and people continues to increase. With that increased interaction there is the potential for conflict and negative impacts for people, their property and pets, and wildlife. Experience and extensive research has shown that if the root causes of conflict are addressed, and people react appropriately when encountering wildlife, that many negative outcomes can be avoided. While not everyone is equally motivated to reduce conflict with wildlife, most of us can agree that personal and community safety is of paramount importance. WildSafeBC's motto highlights this common ground of "keeping wildlife wild and communities safe."
